


Local Landmarks





Margot Fonteyn, one of the 20th century's most famous ballerinas, was born in Reigate and is celebrated for her achievements in dance.


Reigate Priory is a grade 1 listed manor house surrounded by 65 acres of parkland, in the centre of the Surrey town.


Reigate tunnel is the oldest road tunnel in England (and probably UK and Europe). It is about 55 yards long and was designed by William Constable (1783-1861).

1088  **Medieval Beginnings**
The Norman Conquest leads to the building of many castles in England, including early structures that evolved into Reigate Castle.

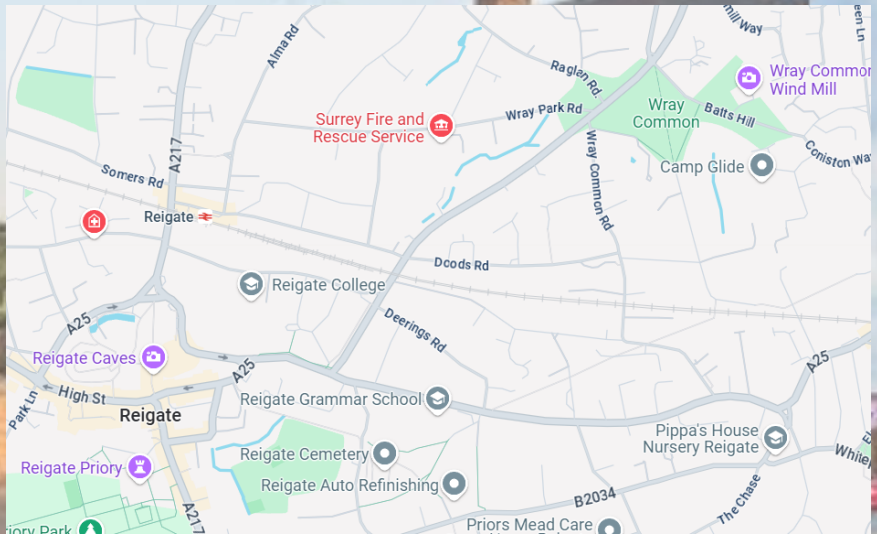
1235  **Reigate Priory House**
was founded by the 6th Earl of Surrey.

1823  **Industrial & Victorian Progress**
The construction of the Reigate Tunnel begins, showcasing engineering advancement.

1849  **Reigate Train Station opens**
serving as a vital transport hub during the Victorian Era.

1980  **Modern Tribute**
A statue of Margot Fonteyn is erected in the castle grounds, honouring her achievements in ballet.

Word	Definition
Landmark	A building or feature that is easily recognised, often of historical significance.
Historical	Relating to the past; especially the time before the present day.
Timeline	A way of showing events in the order they happened, often with dates.
Statue	A sculpture representing a person or thing.
Victorian	Relating to the reign of Queen Victoria (1837-1901) when many significant buildings were constructed.
Castle	A large fortified building or group of buildings, typically built in the past.
Tunnel	A passage created under or through the ground.
Ballet	A form of dance.
Local	A particular area or neighborhood.

Maths:

- Drawing and describing properties of 2D and 3D shapes
- Finding the perimeter of shapes.

Science:
